Reading 'Round the Clock	http://www.infohio.org/goto/RRtC Reading 'Round the Clock features a series of three videos to help parents and caregivers help children practice reading. It was created by a partnership between INFOhio, Ohio Educational Library Media Association, State Library of Ohio, and Ohio Parent Teacher Association. "Reading on the Go", "Reading for a Purpose", and "Reading on the Screen", each under three minutes long, give parents and caregivers concrete, easy tips to help their children become stronger readers and meet Ohio's Third Grade Reading Guarantee. Accompanying tip sheets, for parents of children at each grade from PreK through 3, include basics about reading at that grade, and ideas for fun family activities that support literacy and are age-appropriate. A downloadable poster is great for display in classrooms, waiting rooms, and any place where children and caregivers gather.

It is available to all Ohio students and parents. Use outside of a school's network requires a username and password.
